

Scripture Reading

Acts 20: 17-27, 32-38

From Miletus he sent a message to Ephesus, asking the elders of the church to meet him. When they came to him, he said to them: 'You yourselves know how I lived among you the entire time from the first day that I set foot in Asia, serving the Lord with all humility and with tears, enduring the trials that came to me through the plots of the Jews. I did not shrink from doing anything helpful, proclaiming the message to you and teaching you publicly and from house to house, as I testified to both Jews and Greeks about repentance towards God and faith towards our Lord Jesus. And now, as a captive to the Spirit, I am on my way to Jerusalem, not knowing what will happen to me there, except that the Holy Spirit testifies to me in every city that imprisonment and persecutions are waiting for me. But I do not count my life of any value to myself, if only I may finish my course and the ministry that I received from the Lord Jesus, to testify to the good news of God's grace.

'And now I know that none of you, among whom I have gone about proclaiming the kingdom, will ever see my face again. Therefore I declare to you this day that I am not responsible for the blood of any of you, for I did not shrink from declaring to you the whole purpose of God. And now I commend you to God and to the message of his grace, a message that is able to build you up and to give you the inheritance among all who are sanctified. I coveted no one's silver or gold or clothing. You know for yourselves that I worked with my own hands to support myself and my companions. In all this I have given you an example that by such work we must

support the weak, remembering the words of the Lord Jesus, for he himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

When he had finished speaking, he knelt down with them all and prayed. There was much weeping among them all; they embraced Paul and kissed him, grieving especially because of what he had said, that they would not see him again. Then they brought him to the ship.

Notes from the Director of Music

Today, being the last day of the church year we sort of sum things up by celebrating the Reign of Christ, also called "Christ the King Sunday": thus our **Introit** with the opening words "Christ our Saviour, God and King".

Henry Purcell has been called the greatest composer that England ever produced. Born in London in 1658, he was the son of a Gentleman of the Chapel Royal and when old enough, became a boy chorister in the same Chapel Royal. Around the time his voice broke, he became assistant keeper and tuner of the instruments, including the pipe organ. He soon showed a genius for composition and was appointed "Composer in Ordinary" at the age of nineteen. A couple of years later, in 1679, he was appointed organist at Westminster Abby. In 1683, he was head keeper of the instruments and was always eager to show the large pipe organ to visitors. For this he charged a fee, but when this was discovered by the Chapter, his pay was withheld until he paid to the Abby all that he had collected. Nevertheless, he was eventually pardoned and when he died too young, in 1695, the Chapter recognized his genius as a composer and his great contribution to church music and so he was buried in Westminster Abby with the highest honours and his little venture into being an entrepreneur forgotten.

Purcell's name is often linked with the famous Trumpet Voluntary, although experts believe it to have been written by Jeremiah Clarke. He composed several works for church as well as the theatre and for ceremonial occasions. His famous opera *Dido and Aeneas* will be presented by Queen's music department in the Spring. Today we are happy to have our new choir member Damien Macedo join Bob and Dennis Clark, together with the choir, to present the **Anthem**, *Rejoice in the Lord Alway*. In Purcell's time, the alto part was more commonly done by men singing in their head voice and we are fortunate that Damien has one of these rare voices. The text is from Philippians IV 4-7. With Purcell being an organist, he gives the organ prominence in the opening of the anthem. With the repeated downward scale in the pedal part, like the pealing of bells, the opening is sometimes done as a separate piece, known as the *Bell Symphony*. Thanks to Bob and Dennis for putting together Purcell's original version of this anthem.

Other pieces by Purcell are heard in the **Prelude** and **Offertory**. The **Postlude** is a good example of Purcell's ceremonial style of writing. It is music fit for a King.
