For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Notes from the Director of Music

I have in my Piano Museum, an interesting little piano designed in Sweden and manufactured in 1939 in Toronto, with a decal featuring two Royal crowns and the words "As used by HRH Princess Ingrid of Sweden and TRH Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret of England." I found it interesting that the two English Princesses would give an endorsement to a piano maker, but apparently the two of them took music lessons during the war years with one "Doc" Harris and enjoyed playing on this new kind of "apartment size" piano. William Henry Harris (1883-1973) was an organist, music teacher and composer and became Director of Music at St. George's chapel Windsor castle in 1933. When Elizabeth and Margaret were teenagers, he would round up singers from the chapel choir to join the royal duo in the singing of madrigals once a week. In gratitude, the Princesses would give presents of Argentinian honey to the choristers and their teacher who was affectionately referred to as "Doc" Harris. Harris, like many other teachers, preferred to be known and remembered as an educator but he is chiefly remembered today as a major composer of anthems, hymns, organ music and service settings. The **Anthem** today is a brilliant arrangement of the popular Easter carol based on an old Dutch tune by J. Oudaen (see #259). Harris conducted the music for the coronation of King George VI and later Queen

Elizabeth. The **Postlude** is a piece he composed for the Queen's procession and Harris played it himself for the marriage of Princess Margaret in 1960. I remember watching that wedding on television and being thoroughly awed by the thundering sound of the organ at Westminster Abbey.

Every year at this time it is with sadness that I hear the last of the season's broadcasts of the Metropolitan opera. We can, however, continue to enjoy music from the opera through recordings and performances from other opera houses. We can also hear excerpts played by orchestras or performed on piano or organ. The **Prelude** is from Wagner's well-known *Der Meistersinger* and the **Offertory** is from Handel's little known opera *Berenice*; two beautiful gems from the world of opera.

The **Introit** was chosen because of its theme of nature. It is from hymn #705 and I shall think of it as I somewhat happily cut my grass this week.

With support from Presbyterians Sharing, Michelle Verwey works as a community health advisor to the Church of North India's Central Regional Board of Health Services. She advises on project monitoring, reporting and public health matters. Recently she visited a rural village in Madhya Pradesh, where she met eight-year-old Sarita. Sarita's family received five fruit trees from the PWS&D-supported community health and self-reliance project. Michelle shares, "Malnutrition is very common in Madhya Pradesh. Many children, like Sarita, suffer from stunting – a result of chronic malnutrition. But this project gives me hope that I will be able to watch babies grow to be healthy children with bright prospects for their futures." In 2017, St. Andrew's Kingston has committed the sum of \$25,000 to Presbyterians Sharing as part of our witness." for Presbyterians Sharing.
