

Notes from the Director of Music

Summer is often a time for journeys. Myself, I took an amazing trip to Germany in June and a trip to the Maritime Provinces a few weeks ago. Over the summer we at St. Andrew's have been taking a musical journey of sorts from the music of Schumann and Mendelssohn in the 1840's to the music of the late 1800's. Last week I pointed out that after many years of soppy sentiment, in the latter part of the 1800's, people were looking for something different.

I credited the French with bringing us safely into the 20th century although of course there were many composers from other lands who offered something different without taking us way out on a limb. Our anthem today gives us another opportunity to sing and hear a typical example of what was being written in the mid 1800's. It may seem old fashioned but it is great fun to sing. John L. Hopkins came from a musical family and was organist at Rochester cathedral. Another branch of the family wrote We three Kings of orient are. Yet another musician named John Hopkins composed anthems and wrote a great treatise on organ construction. Lift up your Heads first appeared in a collection of anthems put together in 1882 by the Presbyterian Church of England.

Last week we heard music by a man who could make some of the most powerful and hauntingly beautiful melodies, Gabriel Faure. We hear more of his music in the **Preludes**.

Theodore Dubois (1837-1924) was a very influential French organist who helped bring organ music safely into the 20th century. Two good examples of his music are heard in the **Offertory** and the **Postlude**.

Presbyterians Sharing



Nearly half of the Presbyterian Church in Taiwan's membership is Indigenous. With support from Presbyterians Sharing, Carragh Erhardt (Healing & Reconciliation Program Assistant), the Rev. Dianne Ollerenshaw (Director of Regional Ministries, Synod of Alberta & the Northwest) and Lori Ransom (Healing & Reconciliation Animator, 2006-2011) represented the PCC at the PCT's International Forum on the "Mission of the Church in Taiwan Today." Afterwards they spent six days with PCC mission staff, the Rev. Dr. Paul McLean, and some of his Indigenous colleagues for mutual learning about experiences of reconciliation in Canada and Taiwan. Carragh shares, "I am grateful to the people we met in Taiwan for sharing their experiences and I look forward to continuing this partnership." In 2017, St. Andrew's Kingston has committed the sum of \$25,000 to Presbyterians Sharing as part of our witness.
