

SCRIPTURE READING

Isaiah 53:1-6

Who has believed what we have heard? And to whom has the arm of the Lord been revealed? For he grew up before him like a young plant, and like a root out of dry ground; he had no form or majesty that we should look at him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised, and we held him of no account. Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

Mark 10:35-45

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to him and said to him, 'Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you.' And he said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' And they said to him, 'Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory.'

But Jesus said to them, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?' They replied, 'We are able.'

Then Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared.'

When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So Jesus called them and said to them, 'You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.'

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

The past two Sundays, we have been taking a stroll through the Baroque era and then through the early classical era. We were going to explore organ music in the classical era: but there are two problems. The first problem is that the Classical era and the Romantic era are so much overlapped that it is impossible to say when the Classical era stopped and the Romantic era began. If we look at the musical output of Beethoven, "the man who set music free", we can find elements of Classical music and Romantic. And so, musicologists prefer to talk about the "Classical-Romantic" period in music. And right in the middle of that era, is the other problem: I am stuck on the music of Mendelssohn.

When I listen to or start to play the music of Mendelssohn, I just seem to focus on him alone. There is no "meanwhile" in another country. His music transcends any kind of boundaries. He was a prodigy, a genius, a musical giant and you will get a full dose of his music today.

Jacob Ludwig Felix Mendelssohn was born into a Jewish family in Hamburg in 1809. When his father converted to Christianity, the name changed to Mendelssohn-Bartholdy. Religion and philosophy were important to him: his grandfather Moses Mendelssohn was a famous philosopher (referred to as "the modern Plato") and Felix was a friend of Goethe. He was fascinated by the life and writings of St. Paul and after many successes as a composer, he put together in 1836, the hugely successful oratorio St. Paul. Today's **Preludes** are taken from this important work.

While in Leipzig, Mendelssohn was active in church music and toward the end of his life helped to revive an interest in the music of Bach. He ventured into composing a set of sonatas for organ and we hear an excerpt as today's **Postlude**.

Mendelssohn was very well received in England and premiered his second oratorio *Elijah* in 1845 in Birmingham. The music after the **Sermon** and the **Solo** are taken from this memorable work. This was one of his last compositions. He died just six months later, only 38 years old. O Rest in the Lord, dear Felix.
