

SCRIPTURE READING

Mark 10:46 - 11:11

They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, 'Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!' Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, 'Son of David, have mercy on me!'

Jesus stood still and said, 'Call him here.' And they called the blind man, saying to him, 'Take heart; get up, he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. Then Jesus said to him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' The blind man said to him, 'My teacher, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has made you well.' Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, "Why are you doing this?" just say this, "The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately."

They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, 'What are you doing, untying the colt?' They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy

branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

'Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!'

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

Throughout Lent, we have had a journey through various eras in musical history and today on Palm Sunday, we end with a group of English composers from the Modern era. Many of us, myself included, tend to brace ourselves for a lot of unpleasant discordant "noise" when we are about to hear a piece of modern music. The composers heard today came from a tradition of good church music and all have enriched that genre with their output.

On Palm Sunday we celebrate Christ's triumphal entry into Jerusalem but before we hear the sounds of triumph, we hear more meditative music and are reminded of Jesus the Good Shepherd. Harold Darke (1888-1976) was an important composer of church music and likely had the 23rd Psalm in mind when he composed the first **Prelude.** The second **Prelude** is an example of the output of one of England's most prolific modern era church composers. Eric Harding Thiman was born in Kent in 1900, the son of a Congregational minister, and died in London in 1975. Most of his career was as organist at the Temple Church in London. His music shows great clarity and has been enjoyed by many choirs and organists.

Despite his last name, John Ireland (1879-1962) was born in England. He became an extremely talented and versatile composer. He was slow and methodical and unfortunately his output was rather small. It is hard to find a more moving hymn than today's **Solo**.

Healey Willan was born in England in 1880 and died in Canada in 1968. He is alternately listed as a British composer, a Canadian composer and an Anglo-Canadian composer. Though well respected in England, it was after he moved to Canada to escape WWI that he

really made a name for himself. The piece after the **Lord's Prayer** has a feeling of melancholy and loneliness – perhaps how Jesus was feeling knowing that the people who cheered him on his entry into Jerusalem would ultimately cheer him on to his death.

The printed music by Brian Brockless (1926-1995) for the **Postlude** gives no indication that this piece has anything to do with Palm Sunday. Yet when I first played it, I could only imagine that he had this day in mind. I have recently found out that he, like the other composers featured today, was an Ecclesiastical composer and church organist, and I just cannot imagine playing this piece at any time other than Palm Sunday. It is a triumphal march with a serious undertone and the last few bars are truly tragic. We praised Him, then we rejected Him and then we crucified Him. I think of this every time I play the last chord.

Summer Student's Virtual Ministry

Presbyterians Sharing provides financial assistance for seminary students to gain ministry experience by serving in rural and remote congregations across the country. Last summer, Samuel Andri, a student from the Vancouver School of Theology, served in the Synod of Saskatchewan. Due to COVID-19, Samuel led online worship and



helped deliver a Vacation Bible School program virtually. Though his responsibilities were fulfilled online instead of in person, it did not make his experience any less meaningful. When asked about his summer experience, Samuel said, "I am forever grateful for the opportunity to reflect on what it means to serve God in more rural areas of Canada and to reflect on the beauty of serving God in a more close-knit community even through online platforms."
