

L: Christ is risen!

P: He is risen indeed!

L: The tomb is empty.

P: Life has defeated death!

L: Rising from the grave, Jesus brings life to all the wrong places.

P: Christ lives where death has ruled.

L: Rising from the grave, Jesus brings life to all the wrong people.

P: Christ welcomes those who are often overlooked.

L: Christ's resurrection means that we are no longer lost in the wilderness.

P: He provides us with a living hope and travels with us to places where death had once prevailed.

L: The world has been turned upside down.

P: Life has defeated death! Hope has overwhelmed despair! Joy has conquered gloom!

SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Responsive Psalm 98

Sing a new song to the Lord, who has done marvellous things, whose mighty hand and holy arm have won the victory.

O Lord, you have made known the victory; you have openly shown your righteousness in the sight of the nations.

You remember your mercy and faithfulness to the house of Israel, and all the ends of the earth have seen your victory, O God.

Shout with joy to the Lord, all you lands;

lift up your voice, rejoice and sing.

Sing to the Lord with the harp, with the harp and the voice of song.

With trumpets and the sound of the horn

shout with joy before our sovereign, the Lord.

Let the sea make a noise and all that is in it, the lands and those who dwell therein.

In righteousness shall God judge the world and the peoples with equity.

Matthew 28:1-10

After the Sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it.

His appearance was like lightning, and his clothing white as snow. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the women,

'Do not be afraid; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was crucified. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples, "He has been raised from the dead, and indeed he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him." This is my message for you.' So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. Suddenly Jesus met them and said,

'Greetings!' And they came to him, took hold of his feet, and worshipped him. Then Jesus said to them,

'Do not be afraid; go and tell my brothers to go to Galilee; there they will see me.'

Acts 10:34-43

Then Peter began to speak to them:

'I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ-he is Lord of all. That message spread throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. He commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name.'

NOTES FROM THE MUSIC DIRECTOR

What a wealth of music we have at Easter time! The story of the Resurrection continues to inspire composers and writers as it has for centuries. Today's music is a sample of some very old and some very new Easter music.

Hallelujah! Halleluiah! Halleluyah! Halleluia! Alleluia! There are even more variations in spelling. The word has a Hebrew origin: Hallelu meaning "Praise ye" and Jah (Jahweh) meaning "the Lord". Our opening **Hymn** uses Hallelujahs throughout. It has origins with a Latin hymn and has undergone many transformations over the years.

The **Anthem** has words by John Damascene, also known as John of Damascus. He lived in the 8th century in the city of Damascus, was trained by an Italian monk and became an important official in that city. He later gave away all of his possessions and retired to a monastery near Jerusalem where he became a priest and liked to write poetry. At least two of his poems were translated by John Mason Neale (1818-1866) who called him the greatest poet of the Greek Church. The words are at Hymn 253 and the tune was composed by Sir Reginald S. Thatcher (1888-1957).

The **Postlude** was composed by American John Mansfield who used at least half a dozen different pen names including "Thomas Chesterton". I have in my library, many examples of collections of organ music where the editor has slipped in a few of his own compositions. John Mansfield, as editor of Lorenz Publishing, managed to slip in many of his compositions using other names. This prolific composer died a few years ago.

Hallelujah

Anthem - Come Ye Faithful

Come, ye faithful, raise the strain of triumphant gladness; God hath brought His Israel into joy from sadness; 'tis the Spring of Souls today Christ hath burst His prison, and from three days' sleep in death as a Sun hath risen.

Now the Queen of seasons, bright with day of splendour, with the royal feast of feasts, comes its joy to render; comes to glad Jerusalem, who with true affection welcomes in unwearied strains Jesus' Resurrection.

Neither might the gates of death, nor the tomb's dark portal, nor the watchers, nor the seal, hold Thee as a mortal; but today amidst the twelve Thou didst stand bestowing that Thy peace which evermore passeth human knowing.

Since the beginning of the war in Ukraine, pastors and church workers of the Reformed Church in Transcarpathia, Western Ukraine, have been serving tirelessly, providing spiritual support to those who remained and warmly welcoming refugees and internally displaced people from Eastern and Central

Ukraine. Recognizing the dedication and work of these faithful servants, the Reformed Church in Hungary established a solidarity fund and invited partner churches to join in providing encouragement and financial support. The PCC, through Presbyterians Sharing, along with the First Hungarian Presbyterian Church in East Toronto, Ontario, responded by contributing to the fund, which aims to support 100 pastors and church staff in Transcarpathia with a monthly financial supplement of \$360 CAD.
