SCRIPTURE LESSONS

Psalm 104: 24-30

O Lord, how manifold are your works!

In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures.

Yonder is the sea, great and wide, creeping things innumerable are there, living things both small and great.

There go the ships, and Leviathan that you formed to sport in it.

These all look to you to give them their food in due season;

when you give to them, they gather it up; when you open your hand, they are filled with good things.

When you hide your face, they are dismayed; when you take away their breath, they die and return to their dust.

When you send forth your spirit, they are created; and you renew the face of the ground.

Acts 2:1-21

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked,

'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.'

All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another,

'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.'

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them:

'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

"In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above

and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved."

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

To celebrate Pentecost, we have a feast of hymns, chorales and anthems appropriate for the coming of the Holy Spirit. Probably the most important of the hymns is the Latin Hymn Veni Creator Spiritus which goes back to the 9th Century perhaps from Northern France or the Rhineland. Around 1627 the Latin text was translated by English clergyman John Cosin to be used as a private devotion "in commemoration of the hour when God the Holy Ghost came down upon the Church". This translation and the original plainsong melody is presented as our **Introit** with an accompaniment by Healey Willan. This hymn with a different translation is found in our Book of Praise #402.

The plainsong melody was transformed into a chorale by Johann Klug in 1535 with a translation by Martin Luther. This is used to introduce our first **Prelude** which is a Chorale Prelude treatment by J.S. Bach.

John Cosin's translation was used by English organist and composer Eric Thiman in 1927 to create today's **Anthem.**

The last Hymn deserves some special attention. All three of those involved in its creation gave special focus to the music of the people, and the hymn is thus one that can be very personal. The hymn text goes back to the 14th century. Bianco da Siena was an Italian monk who wrote hymns for the people, for those who wanted to sing at worship. His music was unusual for the time for it related not as much to the clergy of the time, but to the common man. In 1851 his works were finally published in a collection in Italy and then discovered by an Irish priest, Richard Frederick Littledale. Ill health forced Littledale to leave the Anglican priesthood and devote himself to writing. He completed work by John Mason Neale, compiled The People's Hymnal in 1867 and his book Plain Reasons against joining the Church of Rome had a great influence on halting the Oxford Movement in 1880. He is best known, however, for the translation of da Siena's text. The final step in the evolution of this hymn was in 1906 when the English Hymnal was compiled and composer Ralph Vaughan Williams was asked to provide a tune to this lovely text. Vaughan Williams valued and was inspired by the music of the common man and would travel the countryside collecting folk tunes to be later used in his music. The tune Down Ampney was named after his birthplace in Gloucester, and is reminiscent of Anglo-Genevan tunes. With its very personal words and reflective tune, this hymn (#386) remains one of the most beautiful and unique that one can find.

In searching for some sort of fiery **Postlude**, I thought of some of the fiery outbursts in the organ music of Belgian-born composer César Franck (1822-1890). The mighty Cavaillé-Col organ at the church of St. Clotilde in Paris was a great influence on his organ music. Franck's music was sincere and Romantic, very personal and at times almost mystical. His *Fantaisie* is in four movements, the third being the sort of fiery music I was looking for. Unfortunately, it is very short and leads directly into the last movement which is unusual. Rather than ending this long work with an exciting fast dramatic movement, Franck ends the work with music that is slow, soft and serene. This got me

thinking about when the Holy Spirit came to the apostles – the sound of a rushing mighty wind followed by tongues of fire. But what followed then? I can only imagine a feeling of the greatest peace. Jesus referred to the Holy Spirit as "The Comforter". Jesus said "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give unto you". Certainly, the end of Franck's Fantaisie leaves one feeling with a great sense of peace and comfort – appropriate I think, for Pentecost Sunday.

Mission Moment - SAT 7 Canada



SAT-7 is a Christian multimedia ministry that has served people of the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) for the last 28 years through satellite TV and now digital media. They broadcast faith-filled, culturally sensitive television programs to millions in their native languages. Almost 90% of homes in the region have access to satellite TV – a medium which cannot be censored by government or other authorities. Of the 670 million people living in the MENA region, only 4% identify as Christian, so satellite content, produced by and for Middle Easterners, remains the most effective way of overcoming illiteracy and reaching people in the region with the gospel. SAT-7's goal is to lead its audience members from an online to an offline journey. By providing viewer support teams, viewers of all ages can connect with SAT-7 workers over social media, text, email, and phone to receive encouragement, counselling, prayer, and additional discipleship resources. SAT-7 receives hundreds of contacts each day. Through partners on the ground in various countries, we connect viewers as best we can with local churches (sometimes underground) near them.



In 2024, through offerings designated "Mission", members of St. Andrew's Kingston have a goal of contributing \$2,000 towards the work of the church in the world through SAT-7
