

He also said, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come.'

He also said, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; yet when it is sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.'

With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples.

NOTES FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC

In today's organ music, we hear samples from the Couperin family. Like the Bach family of Germany, the musicians of the Couperin family spanned several generations. Starting with Louis (1626-1661) the Couperin family were organists at the church of St. Gervais in Paris from 1653 until 1826; a total of 173 years. The best known of the family was François (1631-1701) who was known as "François le Grand", to distinguish him from the rest of the family. He composed many pieces for harpsichord, but not much of his organ music survived. The **Preludes** come from his set of pieces called *Mass for the Parishes*. His uncle Louis, used the form of a chaconne (which features a repeated phrase) for the very bold piece heard as the **Postlude**. The great organ at the church of St. Gervais proved a great inspiration for the generations of the Couperin family.

In 1955, Charlie Leach and a group of devout Christian men contemplated building a summer camp for Southeastern Ontario. They came across a disused farm on Wolfe Lake, and since the road was impassable, they walked in on foot. The men prayed, asking God for guidance and wisdom, and felt,

with resounding clarity, that the farm was the perfect location for a retreat centre and children's camp.

Charlie and two other men went to visit the landowner - Mrs. Derbyshire of Westport – to offer \$5,000 payable over 25 years. En route to meeting, they stopped in a Westport restaurant and were informed that another organization was offering \$30,000 cash for the farm! Concerned but undeterred, Charlie and the committee proceeded with the meeting and by God's grace, Mrs. Derbyshire was receptive to their plan! She felt that their proposal and vision for the property was exactly what her late husband would have wanted for the future of the farm.

The following year, IAWAH was founded as a non-denominational summer camp. The name is an acronym for Proverbs 3:5-6 "In All Ways Acknowledge Him." – I A W A H

From this humble beginning, IAWAH has grown into a year-round centre for learning, adventure and growth. Thousands of people, both young and old, have met the Lord at IAWAH, while others have grown deeper roots of faith. Today, they continue to journey with youth as they grow in leadership and intimacy with God.

IAWAH is centrally located to serve the communities of Eastern Ontario. It sits tucked against a backdrop of pristine wilderness with over 200 acres of forests, ponds, trails and 2.5 kilometres of private shoreline on Wolfe Lake.

IAWAH offers summer camps, youth leadership and development programs, family retreats, retreat facilities and school programs with emphasis on personal holistic development and growth in faith. Their dedicated staff is committed to providing children, youth, young adults and families a place to connect with one another, with God and with the natural world. Knowing that there is more than one way to help a child grow on a personal and emotional level, and that each young person is unique and has different talents and abilities, IAWAH strives to create a supportive, fun environment that fosters self-discovery and a life knowing God through outdoor adventure, creation, music and friendship.

The not-for-profit organization is governed by the Corporation of IAWAH Christian Ministries — a dedicated group of people who voluntarily serve as stewards of the ministry. A Board of Directors is selected to provide leadership to the Executive Director, within the framework of policy governance. Additionally, there is a year-round staff team supported by over 150 seasonal staff and volunteers, all of who are carefully vetted and chosen to help facilitate the growth of each participant and guest.
